The American Academy of Pediatrics recommends parents and caregivers develop a family media plan that considers the health, education and entertainment needs of students.



Updated technology systems

The updated Naviance Student experience is mobile-friendly and allows access to career and college research, application tools and Personal Growth Plan (PGP) activities. Features like the scattergram and strength explorer identify colleges and careers that match student interests.

A new academic progress and multi-year academic planner in Infinite Campus allows families and students to plan for high school courses and monitor progress toward graduation.

Boosting student outcomes

A soon-to-be released PGP Hub application will improve access and visibility to students' PGPs. As students complete activities, their PGPs are automatically updated. Easy to access on any device, students' progress will be available to counselors, and career and college center staff will be able to send notifications to students about opportunities that align with their goals.

Improving learning environments



Paying It Forward: Parent of graduate finds dream job driving bus

To Tammy O'Loughlin-Vidmar, being a bus driver means much more than driving a bus.

It's connecting with students every day. It's making sure she pronounces their names correctly. It's looking out for the safety of her riders, whether that means making sure they know how to cross the street safely or taking notice when something might be bothering them.

"Kids are our future," said O'Loughlin-Vidmar. "Who knows where they will go. I have the opportunity every day to be a positive influence in their lives."

O'Loughlin-Vidmar is in her third year as a bus driver for Bloomington Public Schools. It's a job she's dreamed of doing for a long time.

"When my son was young, I knew I wanted to be a bus driver," she said, adding that it would have been nice to have a work schedule that coincided with her son's school schedule. Although he is no longer in school, O'Loughlin-Vidmar is thankful that all these years later, she's doing work she's passionate about right in her own neighborhood.

Every school day, she transports students to and from Olson Middle School, Westwood Elementary School, Hillcrest Community School and Nativity of Mary School, a private school BPS contracts with to provide bus services. Outside of her morning and afternoon routes, she has the opportunity to pick up additional trips, like field trips and sports and activity charters. She also cleans buses during the summer months.

Although she loves getting to know her students, she understands the importance of establishing ground rules on her bus and leading by example. "I'm a mom. I know how to set boundaries, and kids respect that." She believes setting expectations early and communicating with students leads to a calm and orderly culture on her bus.

The work isn't without challenges. O'Loughlin-Vidmar says distracted drivers are especially frustrating. "People are texting, talking on the phone, putting on makeup, just not paying attention," she said. "And a lot of drivers just don't stop for buses when their lights are flashing, which is a traffic violation. I'm always on the lookout for drivers who cut off or pull out in front of busses."

Despite the challenges, O'Loughlin-Vidmar feels she's found her dream job.

Last spring, she received a letter from a mother of a middle school student on her bus, detailing how much O'Loughlin-Vidmar's friendly presence and care for her daughter made a difference to their family during a difficult time in her daughter's life.

"That was the best gift I could have received," O'Loughlin-Vidmar said.

Attendance Matters

A new district-wide campaign aimed at improving daily student attendance encourages families to ensure students are in school every day, with a goal of no more than five days absent in a year.

Building good attendance habits has a lasting impact. A recent analysis of Bloomington testing data shows a link between chronic low attendance and lower academic test scores. Research also indicates that chronic low attendance in early grades impacts reading progress and, by 6th grade, is a leading indicator that a student is more likely to drop out of school.

Dimensions Academy High School Grads

The inaugural class of Dimensions Academy High School (DAHS) graduated last spring. The cohort collectively earned more than 1,800 college credits at an estimated value of \$37,875 (based on \$500 per credit at the University of Minnesota).

The two dozen students entered DAHS in 2014 and graduated with their Jefferson and Kennedy high school classmates in May.

DAHS is a two-year program open to academically gifted 9th and 10th grade students. DAHS students take college and high school classes, with the opportunity to earn 35 semester credits from Normandale Community College over two years. Many DAHS students earn additional college credits in 11th and 12th grade through postsecondary enrollment options (PSEO), Advanced Placement and concurrent enrollment courses.
