## Prioritizing Student Well-being

Nearly three years into the district's comprehensive mental health support plan, staff training and practices are focused on the overall well-being of students, including providing vital mental and chemical health services.

This school year, the chemical health program staff working with PhaseZero Recovery Services provided more than 150 individual student sessions, up from 63 sessions during the previous school year.

"These numbers demonstrate our commitment to meeting the growing needs of our student body," said Jennifer McIntyre, executive director of student services.

The district's tailored program offers a comprehensive range of services:

- Confidential one-on-one sessions to address chemical health concerns.
- Support for students struggling with substance use/misuse, along with the involvement of families in the recovery process.
- Case consultation to staff and caregivers navigating student needs.
- Interactive workshops and programs for students and staff to promote chemical health awareness, coping skills, and healthy decision-making.

McIntyre said these efforts resulted in successful placements for students in inpatient treatment programs for substance use/misuse.

"Our collaborative approach connects students with the resources they need to thrive," she added.

Students struggling with mental or chemical health concerns are strongly encouraged to reach out to a trusted adult, or any member of their school's support team of school counselors, social workers, psychologists or nurses.

"Together, we can create a safe and supportive learning environment where all students can reach their full potential," said McIntyre.

**Dr. Jaysen Anderson** will become the new principal of Eden Prairie High School, effective July 1, 2024. BPS extends a heartfelt


thanks and appreciation to Dr. Anderson for his dedicated service and contributions to the Jefferson community the past eight years.

# **Graduation Rates Align with Strategic Vision**

The impact of disrupted learning during the pandemic continues to be reflected in graduation rates throughout Minnesota. Graduation rates for 2023 are significant because they mark the graduation of students who began high school during the first year of the pandemic.


BPS's four-year graduation rate in 2023 dropped slightly to 80.3 percent from 80.9 percent the year before. The statewide four-year rate also slightly declined 0.3 points to 83.3 percent.

Bloomington tracks the longer seven-year rate as a measure of the impact of the district's vision and strategy to ensure students graduate career and college ready. The district's seven-year graduation rate was 90.2 percent and continues to exceed the state average of 89.1 percent.

Despite the additional challenge of including students who began their senior year during the pandemic's first year, the seven-year graduation rate for Jefferson and Kennedy high schools remains strong at 96.3 percent and 89.1 percent respectively. The seven-year rates for Asian and Black/African American students are 96.3 percent and 88.5 percent respectively, ranking as the second highest since 2015. ### **Calendar Changes for READ Act**

Elementary teachers will participate in professional development related to the new Minnesota READ Act next school year. The READ Act aims to ensure every child reads at or above grade level by the end of each school year.

To accommodate the time needed for this training, expect changes to the 2024-25 academic calendar resulting in up to six additional PD/no school days at the elementary level. The dates are still being finalized by administration and the school board, but will likely be added onto the front- or back-end of pre-existing breaks.
